# **Early Learning**

Our educators provide individualized learning experiences that support each child's readiness for school and lifelong success. Through a combination of intentional instruction, meaningful relationships with adults, and play-based learning, children make significant gains in language and literacy, early math and science understanding, and social-emotional development.

# Family Well-Being

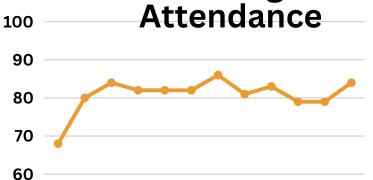

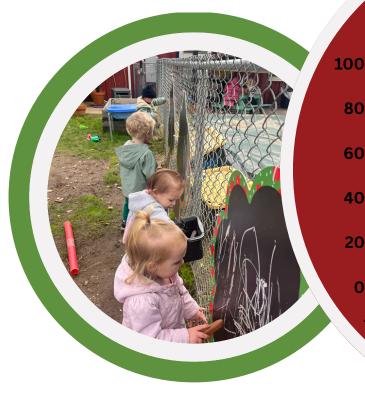
% of Total Average Monthly

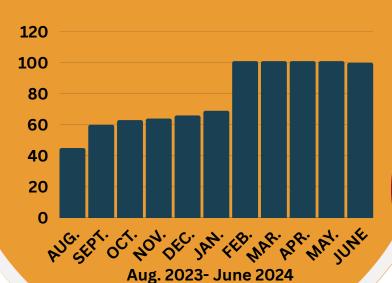
As of 9/30/23, 80% of income eligible or children experiencing homelessness were enrolled in Head Start and Early Head Start.

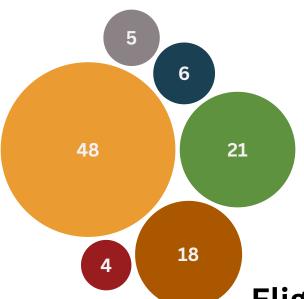

**Early Head Start** 



Children from birth to age five
who are from families with incomes
below the poverty guidelines are eligible
for Head Start services. The HHS Poverty
Guidelines are used to determine income
eligibility for participation in Head Start
programs. Children from homeless families,
and families receiving public assistance
such as TANF or SSI are also eligible.
Foster children are eligible regardless
of their foster family's income.

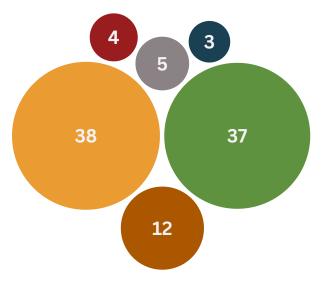

# CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES



We serve children of all abilities, including those with:

- Autism Spectrum Disorder
- Speech and Language Impairment
- Intellectual Disability
- Deaf/ Hard of Hearing
- Developmental Delay
- Other Health Impairment

We ensure that enrolled children with disabilities and their families receive all applicable program services delivered in the least restrictive possible environment and that they fully participate in all program activities.

We make early intervention and referrals to appropriate local agencies

We provide any necessary modifications to the environment, multiple and varied formats for instruction, and individual accommodations and supports as necessary to support the full participation of children with disabilities.

We meet the individual needs of children by working closely with local agencies and school districts to ensure:

\*Services are being provided in the child's classroom or home to the greatest extent possible

\*Services for the child will be planned and delivered as required by their IEP/IFSP

\*Children are working towards their IEP/IFSP goals

\*IEP/IFSP are being reviewed and revised

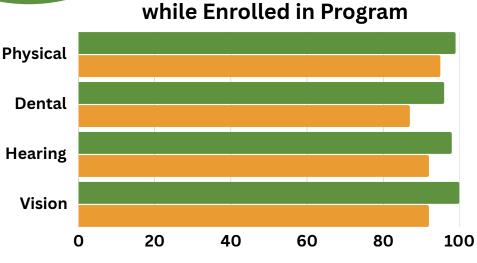

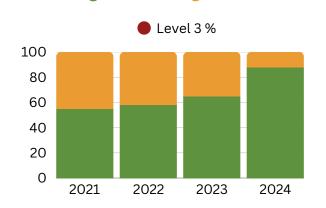


# HISTORICAL PECENTAGE OF CHILDREN BY DENTAL NEED LEVEL

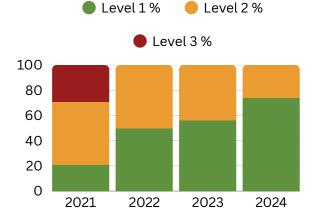

# Parent Meetings

Parent meetings are held monthly throughout the program year. Guardians come together to share important program and policy information, community resources, and have opportunities to be involved in their child's education and development. Parents can connect with one another, share their own experiences and perspectives about their children, and build supportive relationships.

Meetings focus on family topics such as nutrition, health, car seat safety, wellness, community, child development, school readiness, and more.





# Family Engagement Events

Family Engagement events occur throughout the program year and are for children and families to come together and participate in fun age-appropriate activities. Each event:

- Supports family well-being, education and development
- Builds staff and family relationships
- Offers school readiness activities and opportunities to build partnerships
- Fosters a sense of community with positive outcomes.
- Celebrates diversity

Families connect with one another and enjoy positive experiences together.

# Socialization Events

Home Base Socializations
occur twice a month throughout the
program year and are planned jointly
with home-based families. Families share
experiences related to their child's
development, promoting child
development understanding and progress
towards school readiness. Socializations
promote guardian-child relationships and
provide opportunities for peer
interactions, supporting parenting
skills and fostering
partnerships.

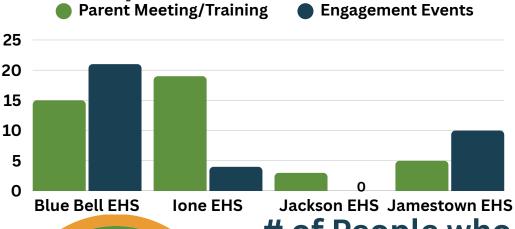
# of People Who Attended for HS

#of People Who Attended for Early HS



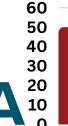

The goal of the ATCAA Head Start Food Program is to create a positive environment that encourages children to make healthy choices at their own pace.

- We focus on providing a safe mealtime environment and offer healthy options from different cultures.
- We emphasize nutritional education with the hope of establishing lifelong healthy eating habits.
- We believe children are capable eaters and should be viewed as curious learners rather than picky eaters.
- We introduce new foods in a non-pressured setting, understanding that it takes multiple attempts for children to welcome different flavors.
- We implement family-style dining which allows children to responsibly serve themselves and build social skills.

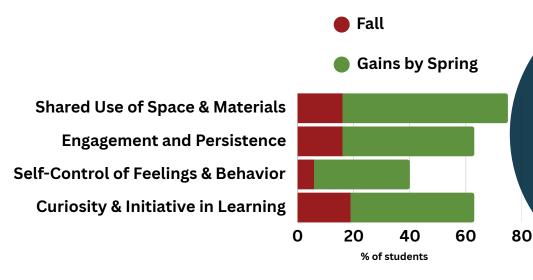
# SCHOOL READINESS



## **#1. APPROACHES TO LEARNING**

All Head Start students are assessed for school readiness using the Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP)\*. This assessment is conducted in the fall and spring of each school year. There are five key domains used to measure readiness in 3-and 4-year-old children.

How 4-year-old Students Approach Learning



Approaches to Learning skills include attention maintenance, engagement and persistence, and curiosity and initiative. The Self-Regulation skills include self-comforting, self-control of feelings and behavior, imitation, and shared use of space and materials.

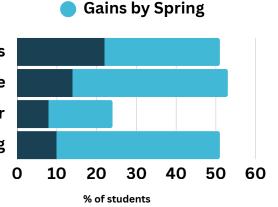
